VOLUNTEER (V-TEAM) OVERVIEW

The Negro Southern League Museum (NSLM) developed and implemented a volunteer program called V-TEAM in November 2017. The purpose of V-TEAM is to help strengthen the museum's organizational structure while enlarging its footprint within the Greater Birmingham Metropolitan Area and beyond. The V-TEAM will help carry out the museum's mission, which is to preserve the history of African-American baseball and to educate the world on Birmingham's contribution to the sport of baseball.

To ensure members of the V-TEAM are prepared to meet the expectations of the Negro Southern League Museum's stakeholders and supporters, NSLM has developed a one-day training seminar designed to educate, enlighten and promote positive feelings about the Negro Southern League Museum.

The V-TEAM training seminar is a two-hour course that will enable potential V-TEAM members to view and learn in-depth information about the collection, meet and greet museum stakeholders and receive important information about the museum. The purpose of the training seminar is to provide valuable information to prepare people to serve the museum. At the conclusion of the training seminar, participants will have a better understanding of the collection, the goals and objectives of the museum, museum operations and be able to identify key stakeholders within the organization. At the conclusion of the V-TEAM training seminar and after the participant has remitted the volunteer application fee, and undergone a one-on-one interview with the museum's director/curator, an individual will now become a member of the V-TEAM.

The V-TEAM Training seminar will include the following:

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VOLUNTEER (V-TEAM) HANDBOOK

The Negro Southern League Museum (NSLM) tells the story of African-American baseball in America through the eyes of Birmingham, Alabama. The museum features the largest collection of original Negro League baseball artifacts in the country. NSLM also features an on-site Research Center that is supported by a research team made up of seven of the top researchers in Negro League and Southern League baseball history.

Programs:

Pitch Talk-is a program developed by the museum that discusses the issues and topics related to or that directly affects the Birmingham community. This thought-provoking engaging event encourages healthy dialogue and discussion from experts.

Jackie Robinson Day at NSLM-is a special event developed by the museum to commemorate and honor one of baseball's most influential players, Jackie Robinson. Jackie Robinson Day is celebrated annually throughout Major League Baseball. It celebrates the day Jackie Robinson entered into the league and broke the color barrier. The Negro Southern League Museum commemorates this day with great food and activities.

Tour Tuesdays at NSLM-is a 12-month program developed by the Negro Southern League Museum that features an impactful program schedule during baseball season (April through September). The purpose of Tour Tuesdays is to provide groups with an opportunity to tour the Negro Southern League Museum free of charge while enjoying educational and entertaining activities developed to enhance the visitor's experience.

A group is considered 10 or more individuals. Kids seven and under are free. The museum also offers a guided tour called The Director's Tour. The cost is \$150.00. It lasts for one hour and tour participants receive a free gift.

COLLECTION TALKING POINTS

Rotunda:

The Negro Southern League Museum (NSLM) opened in August 2015. The museum is a joint venture between the City of Birmingham and the Center for Negro League Baseball Research.

NSLM houses the largest collection of Negro League baseball artifacts in the country!

During your visit, you will learn about the history of African-American baseball in America through the eyes of Birmingham, AL.

The unique map shows the locations where Negro League teams played. The BBB stands for the Birmingham Black Barons. The years 1942, 1943 and 1948 are the championship years for the Birmingham Black Barons.

The one-of-a-kind chandelier features bats specifically turned to match Jackie Robinson's most commonly used bat.

Dugout:

The Dugout features over 1,600 original single signed baseballs of former Negro League players.

History Hall:

Birmingham had three professional baseball teams. The first professional baseball team was the Birmingham Unions. They played one short season in 1897.

The second team was the Birmingham Giants formed in 1904 by Charles "C.I." Taylor. They were one of the top teams in the South.

The third team was the Birmingham Black Barons formed in 1920 by Frank Perdue.

Infield Area:

Tells the story of the integration of baseball and how the process impacted black baseball players from the South. Jackie Robinson broke the color barrier in 1947 and changed baseball forever.

One of the most important pieces in this part of the collection is Rev. Bill Greason's jersey from the Rochester Red Wings of the American Association. Rev. Greason also played in the Major Leagues with the St. Louis Cardinals in 1954.

Also included in the gallery is an in-depth discussion on how segregation impacted sports in the City of Birmingham.

The gallery ends with a tribute to the Birmingham Barons team that integrated the Southern League in 1964.

The Back Stop and Grandstand Area

The seating in our grandstand is comprised of original seating that comes right from historic ballparks that are associated with Negro League baseball.

Leagues Area:

After the Birmingham Barons integrated, several great African-American ball players like Reggie Jackson, Michael Jordan and Frank Thomas played for the Barons.

Rickwood Field:

The oldest professional baseball park in the United States. It has been preserved by the Friends of Rickwood Field and the City of Birmingham.

African-American Ball Players from Birmingham Who Made the Major Leagues:

The Hairston family sent three generations starting with Sam Hairston, then his sons Jerry and Johnny and finally his grandsons Jerry Jr. and Scott to the Majors.

Negro Southern League Museum Research Center:

The Negro Southern League Museum is supported by a research team made up of seven of the top researchers in Negro League and Southern League baseball.

Industrial Leagues:

Before there was a Negro League there were company-sponsored teams. The league was the Birmingham Industrial League.

The Birmingham Industrial League was the proving ground for young ball players.

The current museum's first and current Board president, Melvin Humes, is featured in this gallery.

National Treasures of the Negro Leagues: Some of the most important artifacts on display here are: Louis Santop's game used bat called "Big Bertha." Santop was the first great power hitter of black baseball.

McCallister Trophy-oldest known trophy related to black baseball.

American Series Trophy-This trophy was awarded to a Negro League all-star team that competed in Cuba in 1925. The team consisted of five Hall of Famers.

Willard Brown's game used glove-Brown was one of the greatest Negro League baseball players of all time. He has been inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame.



POSITIONS

NLI Member:

Former Negro League and Industrial League players tasked with conducting guided tours at the Negro Southern League Museum.

Director's League:

Civically engaged Negro League and Industrial League players tasked with helping the museum reach its yearly fundraising goals.

Responsibilties:

- ◆ Lead charitable giving amongst Negro League and Industrial League players
- ◆ Create, implement and execute one yearly fundraiser to benefit the museum
- ◆ Assist and accompany the museum director on fundraising tasks and speaking engagements
- ◆ Serve as a spokesperson and advocate for the museum

Time commitment: Consent to serving one two-year term.

Reports to: Museum Director



Volunteer Team (V-Team) Members

Front Desk Assistant-welcomes guests to the museum. Serve as a liaison between the general public and the museum.

Responsibilties:

- Provide outstanding customer service to all supporters, clients, visitors, volunteers and staff members
- ◆ Provide important and accurate information about the museum and the collection to visitors
- ◆ Maintain museum records and files pertaining to attendance
- ◆ Assist with museum tours and events
- ◆ Manage phone lines
- Help maintain the museum's appearance

Time commitment: Consent to serving a three-month term with a minimum of five hours per week (12 pm to 5 pm)

Reports to: Museum Director

Museum Keeper: helps maintain the appearance of the museum.

Responsibilties:

- ◆ Ability to lift up to 20 pounds
- ◆ Trash disposal (inside and outside)
- ◆ Assist with routine maintenance projects including, but not limited to:
 - A. Case and window cleaning
 - B. Floors (sweeping and mopping)
 - C. Stocking (bathrooms, front desk and Research Center)

Time commitment: Consent to serving a three-month term with a minimum of four hours per month.

Reports to: Museum Curator



MP (Marketing and Promotions Assistant)-market and promote museum-sponsored initiatives, activities, programs and events.

Responsibilties:

- ◆ Setup promotional displays to promote the museum at various events, businesses and attractions throughout the Greater Birmingham Metropolitan area
- ◆ Produce, write and edit promotional materials for the museum's website and Social media pages
- Develop strategies to increase the museum's followers on social media

Time commitment: Consent to serving a three-month term with a minimum of two hours per week. **Reports to:** Museum Director

Campaigner-assist the museum with reaching its yearly fundraising goals.

Responsibilties:

- ◆ Assist with donor stewardship, renewal and recognition activities
- ◆ Collaborate with the fundraising team to identify and solicit major donors
- Assist with general fundraising activities

Time commitment: Consent to a two-year commitment and make 80% of all scheduled fund raising meetings and events.

Reports to: Museum Director

CA (Curatorial Assistant)-assist the museum's curator with the collection.

Responsibilties:

- ◆ Perform curatorial work including but not limited to organization storage areas, maintenance of material containers and preparation and digital preservation of collection materials
- ◆ Answer requests from the public and/or other institutions for identification or information concerning the collection and donated artifacts


